Have you ever been lost? I'm sure nearly everyone has had that experience at some time.

My earliest memory was when I was a toddler, shopping with my mother in the old Woolworth's store in Stockport. In those days all the goods for sale were laid out on high counters arranged in a rectangular fashion. I remember looking around and suddenly realising my mother was nowhere to be seen. In fact, she was just around the corner of the counter, and very soon found me - but I still have a clear memory of that brief moment of panic even now, - and learned a lesson not to wander off (but not very well, according to Rosie!)

Another significant memory is of getting lost when hill walking in Norway with college friends. We had decided to climb the ridge of hills between one fjord and the neighbouring one, where we would be picked up and transported back to our Youth Hostel.

All went well until, after a demanding climb, we reached the summit, where the path split into two. It was only then that we discovered the route we were following did not match with the actual landscape. We then realised the map we had borrowed was drawn up for skiers in winter and the 'paths' we were following were ski tracks. We still had a long way to go to our rendezvous point, and a wrong choice would leave us stranded without transport. By resorting afresh to basic map reading and compass direction, we eventually got back on track, and tired and weary, reached our pick-up point. The lesson here was - make sure your guidance is fit for purpose, and that you really understand it.

It also helps if you have a good sense of direction. I was always fairly confident of my competence in this respect; that is, until I visited Australia, on my first experience of the Southern Hemisphere. It was only then that I realised my sense of direction is closely related to where the sun is positioned in the sky. In the UK, it is generally in the south, whereas in the Southern Hemisphere it is in the north. I still have a problem, when looking at a photograph of Sydney Harbour Bridge, in deciding whether the view is looking seawards or in the inland direction!

I'm certainly not alone in this regard. When I was working, a colleague from our South African office was visiting us. While he was here, he had to make a visit to a client in Leeds. So he set off from Stockport on what was a straightforward motorway journey. It was only when he saw motorway signs for Warrington that he realised he was travelling West and not East. He did eventually get to Leeds, somewhat embarrassed.

I suppose the message is - sometimes our inbuilt compass can lead us astray, and what we are used to may not always be right.

It all goes to show there are different ways to getting lost, but whatever the cause, it can be deeply disturbing.

Feeling lost is one aspect of anxiety; not knowing what to do, which way to turn. Sadly, anxiety has become an increasing problem for many as the current Coronavirus continues to impact on our lives. We have seen it especially in the last few weeks as the exam results system has resulted in severe mental stress amongst teenagers planning their next steps in education or work.



Meanwhile the recurring outbreaks of the disease have been a continuing source of concern for all of us, especially for the more vulnerable members of society. When you factor in the longer term prospects for the economy, the outlook looks bleak.

Generally, people feel restricted, confined, and worried about what the future holds for them and their families. In truth, life inevitably throws up its problems at one time or another, but the current frequency and intensity is what is taking its toll.

However, when we personally experience times like this, we can remind ourselves of Jesus' words to His followers:- 'Come unto me all who are heavy laden, and I will give you rest.' What He is telling us is that if we put our trust in Him, lay aside the burden of our worry and anxiety, the path ahead will become clearer and our stress diminished. Anxiety is worrying about the daily decisions we have to make in life and worry of itself does not improve the situation. Instead, it can drain us of our energy. Putting our trust in God enables us to put our concerns on one side, and allow the way ahead to become clearer.

For Jesus is the one who loves us, and will find us when we are lost.

He can be the source of reliable guidance - often through the actions of someone we know.

He is the sun, who gives us our sense of direction.

He is our 'Compass Point', and, for us at Stockport Sunday School, that is a place where we can share together in worship and fellowship and support each other. So let us hope and pray the day will come soon when we can return to our normal activities together.

In the meantime, may the words of the old, familiar hymn, encourage us:-

Through the night of doubt and sorrow
Onward goes the pilgrim band.
Singing songs of expectation,
Marching to the promised land.

Clear before us in the darkness, Gleams and burns the guiding light. Brother clasps the hand of brother, Stepping fearless through the night.



ZOOM SERVICES



ZOOM SERVICE, AUGUST 2ND 2020

In his service of August 2nd, Stuart looked back at some of the things that had happened in the last year.

The first photograph he showed us was the damaged Toddbrook Dam that had threatened to release 300 million gallons of water that would have destroyed Whaley Bridge. Thanks to the prompt action of engineers and the RAF, the disaster was averted. Today, the dam has been strengthened but the work is still ongoing.





Next, Stuart showed us a photograph of two astronauts who had blasted off to visit the space station on May 13^{th} . These men were due to splash down at 7.30pm (on August 2^{nd}) on their

return to earth. They would be the first men since 1975 to land in the sea. More recent astronauts have returned to earth by space shuttle that lands on

an air strip like a plane. We also saw a picture of the Apollo 11 astronauts and saw how space suits had changed over the years.

This week saw the announcement of two unique events. Boeing announced that they will stop production of Boeing 747 the original jumbo jet which started to carry passengers in the seventies and during its lifetime carried 3 1/2 million passengers. This is the end of the wide bodied jet plane. We saw a picture of a 1909 biplane from which they had developed.

Argos has also announced that they will stop printing their catalogues due to people moving to online shopping. Stuart showed us some products that had appeared in the catalogues over the years. Argos has produced over a billion copies since it started. A number only beaten by the Bible for the number of homes it could be found in.

Jayne read the passage from Matthew 14, the feeding of the five thousand. How did Jesus do that? He took what was offered, the loaves and fishes of a boy's lunch and used them to feed everyone. God will provide for our needs. If we offer Him our lives, He will use them for His purpose. He doesn't always tell us how to do things. If we have faith and listen to His word He will guide us. Without His help, mankind would not have developed and invented new things.

Covid has changed the way we live our lives. Maybe it will make us value and appreciate other people more.

The following is an extract from the letter:-


"It's hard to believe that used stamps can help transform the life of someone affected by leprosy. The fact is they can!





and you're not a great sight to behold!



Recipe

Creamy pancetta pasta with mushrooms

Serves 4

600g pappardelle pasta
100g-200g cubed pancetta
175g chestnut mushrooms, wiped and finely sliced
225ml double cream
75g grated Parmesan cheese
Freshly ground black pepper

Cook the pasta according to the packet instructions.

Meanwhile put the pancetta in a medium pan over a medium to high heat. When it starts to go brown, add the mushrooms and cook for about 2-3 minutes, then add the double cream. Once the cream is hot, add the parmesan and stir together well.

Once pasta is cooked, drain and then return to the pan. Add the creamy mixture and stir well through. Season with some black pepper. Serve hot with a green salad.

HYMN: The story behind ... JUST AS I AM

The hymn 'Just As I Am' must be one of the most famous in the world. It has been sung by tens of millions of Christians at Billy Graham Crusades the world over, just for starters! Yet it was not written by a professional who was 'aiming' at a specific market, as many songs seem to be written today. Instead, it was written by an artist in Victorian times.

Her name was Charlotte Elliott, and she was born in Clapham in 1789. She grew up in a well to do home, and became a portrait artist and also a writer of humorous verse. All was well until Charlotte fell ill in her early 30s, and slid into a black depression. A minister, Dr Caesar Malan of Switzerland, came to visit her. Instead of sympathising, he asked her an unexpected question: did she have peace with God? Charlotte deeply resented the question and told him to mind his own business.

But after he left, his question haunted her. Did she have peace with God? She knew that she did not, that she had done some very wrong things. So, she invited Dr Malan to return. She told him that she would like to become a Christian, but would have to sort out her life first.

Dr Malan again said the unexpected: "Come just as you are." The words were a revelation to Charlotte. She had assumed that she would have to put her life in order before she could hope to be accepted by God. Instead, she realised that Jesus wanted her just as she was and He would take care of the sin. Charlotte became a Christian that day.

14 years later, in 1836, Charlotte wrote some verses that summed up how it had been between her and Jesus that day. They ran:

Just as I am, without one plea, But that thy blood was shed for me, And that thou bids't me come to Thee O Lamb of God, I come! I come!

Just as I am, tho tossed about With many a conflict, many a doubt Fightings within, and fears without, O Lamb of God, I come! I come!

Charlotte could not have dreamed that 150 years into the future, her verses would be sung by millions of people all over the world, as they responded to the Gospel presented at many great Billy Graham crusades, and made their way forward to do just as the hymn describes to come to Jesus Christ, despite sin and fear and doubts, to come 'just as I am.'

ST BIRINUS - APOSTLE OF WESSEX. DIED 650

Did you ever feel that God was calling you to do something big for Him, even though you were not quite sure of the details? If so, Birinus is the saint for you.

He was a French Benedictine monk who in 634 was made a bishop at Genoa, and sent by Pope Honorius 1 to extend the evangelisation of England. (Augustine had arrived in Canterbury about 35 years before.)

Birinus landed at Hamwic, near Southampton. His original plan was to evangelise Wessex and then penetrate up into the Midlands, where no preacher had ever yet reached. But Birinus soon found the West Saxons so pagan that he decided to concentrate just on them.

Birinus had little to help him become the apostle to Wessex. So, he simply used what he did have: his own two feet and his voice. He wandered around preaching at every opportunity, trusting in God to help him. And He did: Birinus became known and respected, and soon a big breakthrough occurred: for political reasons the King of Wessex, Cynegils, wanted to convert to Christianity, and he asked Birinus to help him.

So Birinus instructed and baptised King Cynegils, who was then able to marry the Christian king of Northumbria's daughter, Cyneburg, and in due course Birinus baptised their family as well.

ST BIRINUS - APOSTLE OF WESSEX. DIED 650 CONTINUED

In return, Cynegils gave Birinus the town of Dorchester (upon Thames) to be his diocesan see. It was a perfect location: a Romano-British town right on a road and a river, in the midst of a populated area.

During his 15 years as Bishop of Dorchester, Birinus baptised many people and built churches all over the area, with the king's blessing.

Before he died in 650, Birinus dedicated a church at Winchester. It was a glimpse of the future: for Winchester's growing importance made it inevitable that in time it would also become the ecclesiastical centre of the kingdom.

PSALM 23 - A PSALM FOR THE PANDEMIC

There are few psalms as personal and real as Psalm 23. It records David's experience of God as his Shepherd going through dark times. In the midst of the effects of a global pandemic, this psalm speaks to the fears that can overwhelm us.

He Knows Me: 'The Lord is my shepherd...' Just as a good shepherd knows every sheep in his flock, so God knows each one of us intimately.

He Provides for Me: 'He makes me lie down in green pastures...' Just as the shepherd knows the needs of his sheep, so God will provide what we need in our lives and circumstances.

He Guides Me: 'He guides me along the right paths...' Just as the shepherd leads the sheep to the best pastures, so God provides the best for us, as we listen and follow Him.

He Protects Me: 'Even though I walk through the darkest valley...' Just as the sheep have no need to fear danger when following the shepherd, so we live knowing God's presence and protection.

He Comforts Me: 'your rod and your staff, they comfort me.' As the shepherd's rod defends the sheep, and the staff enables him to control the sheep, so God comforts us through His Word and discipline.



The final verses of the psalm (v5-6) offer the security of knowing that our lives are in His hands, even through death, as He leads us to the home we've been looking for all our lives.

Some years ago, a great actor was asked to recite Psalm 23, but asked one of the other guests to do the same. His remarkable rendition was followed by the other man, an older Christian speaking from the heart. Afterwards the actor said: 'The difference between us is that I know the psalm, but he knows the shepherd.'

OBERAMMERGAU

Oberammergau is a small village in Bavaria, Germany. When in 1633 bubonic plague was sweeping through Europe, a man travelling back home to Oberammergau for Christmas brought the plague with him. It spread throughout the village. According to local tradition, a vow was made that if God would spare them, the villagers would perform a play depicting the life and passion of Jesus Christ every ten years. The village was saved from all effects of the plague and the villagers kept their word and first performed the Passion Play in 1634. It has since been performed every ten years. (The 2020 Play has been rescheduled for May 2022, due to the pandemic)

Death stalked the streets in the Bavarian village As the plague brought havoc, death and despair, Europe was ravaged as millions died, Neither man or woman or child was spared.

They gathered together in desperation A vow was given - if they could be saved A play would be made of the Saviour's life This was the promise the villagers gave.

Miracle of miracles their village survived,
Not one more death their lives had been saved,
So every ten years this Play is performed
To honour the God who had come to their aid.

Prayers were made and the answer came
A heavenly lesson we too can own,
That He who dwells in ineffable light
Is also the One who brings blessings down.

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
WHAT AM I?




