

We are living in difficult times. Covid; fuel shortages; inflation and the sudden breakdown of peace in Europe, have all seriously disturbed our way of life in so many ways. It makes us realise how fortunate we have been as a nation, for the last 70 years or so.

But, if we look back over history, such periods are not unusual, either in our own country, or in the world at large. The secret is to learn from past mistakes and act accordingly.

And one 'history book' that most of us have read, (in part at least,) - the Bible, - can be a guide in this respect, as the nation of Israel has had more than its fair share of tribulation over the centuries.

Of course, the Bible differs from other history books in that it looks at Israel's past from a religious point of view, based on their status as God's chosen people. They were a nation with a unique relationship with God, and



Recently I have been reading a brief commentary on the book of Ezra. It's not one of the most familiar books in the Old Testament and it is one of the shorter ones, dealing specifically with the rebuilding of the temple in Jerusalem, beginning in 537BC.

Ezra sees the prompting of God, both in the past history of Israel, and in the events of his own time.

The previous temple building had been erected by Solomon in a time of

national prosperity. However, after his death, the nation fell into civil war, with a succession of kings, some good, some bad. In the process the religious basis for the nation's identity, their adherence to God's laws, was weakened with severe consequences

Eventually, Israel was invaded by the Babylonians, the temple destroyed, the treasures and holy articles taken away. The people were carried off into exile in Babylon, and it would be 70



years, as forecast by the prophet Jeremiah, before they would be able to return. It was then that Cyrus, who had conquered the Babylonians and had been recently crowned the King of Persia, not only released the Israelites, but decreed that they be allowed to build a new temple in Jerusalem.

God moves in mysterious ways!



During their trials and tribulations in exile, the people had gradually recovered their sense of national identity and their relationship with the one true God. So, on returning to their homeland, they set forth with enthusiasm on rebuilding the new temple as a symbol of their return to obedience to God's Laws.

The project did not go smoothly. Their neighbours were afraid that Israel might regain their former power and influence, as in the days of Solomon, and they succeeded in persuading Cyrus's successor, Artaxerxes, to halt the project. However, the prophets, Haggai and Zechariah, encouraged the people to re-start the building. In parallel, they persuaded the Local Governor to write to the new king, Darius, asking him to confirm the original decree of Cyrus and allow the construction of the temple to be re-started - which he did, and in due course the temple was completed and consecrated with much rejoicing

Ezra's objective throughout was to call the people back to worship and obedience to God. This he achieved, albeit with one or two 'wobbles'. As so often happens, when things go well, the people assume it is all due to their own individual efforts, and pride and excessive self confidence all too soon lead to a change of fortunes.

It's an interesting story, and like so many accounts in the Bible, we can recognise modern day similarities - in Russia and elsewhere, we can see the rulers' lack of commitment to God's Laws - abandoning honesty and truth, being careless for the needs of others; seeking to gain or retain power at any cost, with a disregard for the suffering, destruction, or the equivalent of enslavement that so often ensues.

It is a sad example, yet again, of history's mistakes being repeated. We can only hope and pray that justice, truth and what is right in God's eyes will soon prevail as we seek to support these victims of oppression in our time.

On the positive side, the book of Ezra is just one small reminder for us that good can and will prevail for those who maintain their trust in God. He will provide the strength and determination needed for working for a just cause, so that nations and cities can be rebuilt and that virtue can be restored in society.

We have seen that take place in Europe after the waste and destruction of the Second World War.

So let us pray for our leaders to act with wisdom in the challenging times that lie ahead.

And for God to help each of us to play our part in supporting all those who are struggling with the problems that beset our nation and the world as a whole in these difficult days.

Remembering our Lord's words,

"Whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of mine - you did for me"

Those wanting to be found out feel they are not good enough, perhaps feel they have been over promoted, not good enough for the job they hold or the family they have.

We are not good at judging ourselves because we judge ourselves by worldly standards, not as God sees us, judged by His values.

In the gospel, Jesus is waiting to be discovered. At His trial He stood in open court

surrounded by His accusers and false witnesses, vulnerable and humiliated. But He stands firm.

Peter on the other hand hid in the shadows where the light of the fire did not reach him. When he is challenged he denies knowing Jesus three times. He is waiting to be found out.

As Christians we are called out of the shadows to do his work. We may not feel worthy of that calling. We will not be judged by worldly standards. God cares about us, He made us in His

image. He cares about what is in our hearts and how we respond to His call.

ORANGE is the colour of waiting - pray for patience whilst we wait for things to get back to normal


GREEN is the colour of life and growth, pray for the people who are growing and producing our food.

Recipe

Warm chorizo, avocado and feta salad

Serves 2

8 mini chorizo cooking sausages, halved

100g baby plum tomatoes, halved

2 handfuls watercress, woody stems discarded

2 tsp sherry vinegar

1 tsp Dijon mustard

1 tbsp olive oil

100g feta, crumbled

½ avocado, sliced

Crusty bread to serve



Fry the chorizo until browned and cooked through. Add the tomatoes to the same pan, season and cook until they just start to soften.

Put the watercress onto two plates. Whisk together the vinegar, mustard and olive oil, season and use to dress the watercress.

Scatter over the feta and avocado, then spoon over the tomatoes and chorizo. Eat with crusty bread.



MEMORIES OF 1977 SILVER JUBILEE CELEBRATIONS

My interest in the Royal Family all began back in 1977. I was 6 years old and Stockport Sunday School Girl Friday group held a 'Silver Jubilee' party for the children. We celebrated with games on the field and we enjoyed a 'Jubilee' party tea. A vivid memory of the day was being given red, white and blue ice cream as part of the tea, this was the first time I had seen anything like this, hard to believe now with all the endless options available to us today. At the end of the party, we were all given a souvenir to mark the Silver Jubilee, a metal

pencil tin with a picture of Queen Elizabeth II and the dates of the Silver Jubilee. Little did I know then that that pencil tin would be the first piece for my collection of Royal memorabilia. Over the years, since that first piece, I have collected many pieces from newspaper articles to china, glassware, textiles,



books etc dating back to the reign of Queen Victoria and continuing through to the Royal Family of today, and to think it all began when I received that pencil tin from a Sunday School event. Many years later I was pleased to be able to share some of my collection with Sunday School members at another of the Queen's celebrations.



It is amazing to think that the Queen has been on the throne for 70 years and we are able to celebrate her Platinum Jubilee with her. I attended the Civic Service at St Mary's Church on Thursday evening to mark the Jubilee (the order of service was beautifully presented, the latest 'souvenir' for my collection) and then watched the mayor lighting the Platinum Jubilee beacon outside the church afterwards, a new memory created 45 years after my Silver Jubilee memory. The evening was well attended and



it was a lovely way to mark such a special occasion for a wonderful monarch who has certainly dedicated her life to serving her country.

A huge thank you to everyone who has so kindly added to my collection over the years with different pieces, it is very much appreciated, it always amazes me how many different pieces have been made or written about the Royal Family over the years

He had a great sense of humour and made us all chuckle when he told us that it was a new vicar and today was his first burial at Forest Chapel!! We all got back into the car with smiles on our faces and a lightness in our hearts—just what Sheila would have wanted, and then off we went to Tytherington Christian Fellowship






