Last weekend was a special occasion for our family.

David, my son, and his wife Louise have been going through the process of adopting a two year old little girl, Maddie and the occasion was the final stage of what has been a long drawn-out procedure.

It was the formal granting of what is known as the Adoption Order in Court.

There have been many hurdles to jump, but Maddie is well settled in her new family and it was an occasion for us all to celebrate together.

The modern day process of adoption is much different from how I remember it when I was young. Generally it was a subject not talked about much; possibly to avoid the child feeling they were different in some way from their companions and friends.

Indeed a friend of mine only discovered she had been adopted from a chance remark by a family friend when she was in her sixties! Although a bit of a shock, it was not a cause for concern, because, as she said, she had had a happy upbringing in a loving family.

And that is what the adoption agencies are aiming to achieve.

What is different nowadays is that the process is more open, and rather than being focussed on the wish of the adoptive parents for a child, it is focussed primarily on the needs of the individual child.

It is a demanding process for all concerned. but there is lots of backup support for the parents and the wider family, (including a guide book for grandparents !)

What is apparent is that adopting can be a challenging task, and, speaking personally, those who do take it on have my highest admiration.

Writing about this topic was prompted when I was reading recently some Bible notes on Paul's Epistle to the Galatians, in which he is very critical of the direction which the developing church there is taking.

Some of the Jewish members were putting pressure on fellow Jews and Gentiles to follow particular aspects of Jewish religious laws. It may be some of them were adopting these requirements to avoid persecution by the Jewish Zealots.

In Paul's view, this approach was incompatible with the Christian gospels.

Having been a Zealot himself until his conversion on the road to Damascus, Paul was well aware of what was at stake. In his letter he points out that Christ had come to release mankind from dependence on detailed written rules, and as a result Jesus had been attacked by the religious authorities.



Paul's message is that we are called to commit ourselves to building a relationship with God, as demonstrated by Jesus and His teaching, much of which is actually based on Old Testament scripture. As Jesus said, "I have not come to abolish the Law and the Prophets but to fulfil them." We have to differentiate between those rules which are based on God's will and wisdom, and what are merely man-made to establish control of the people.

What I found particularly interesting was that in his letter, Paul likens this relationship to that of God adopting us as His children; for us to feel able to call Him 'Abba, Father'.



God wants us to trust in Him, not as a ruler but as someone who loves us and cares for us, and grieves for us if we move away from Him.

For as we know, 'children' are not always compliant; especially in their teens!

But if the relationship is right, the problems can be resolved. So there is always hope for us in our relationship with God.

It is perhaps also worth remembering that Jesus himself was in a sense 'adopted' by Mary and Joseph who were taking responsibility for His upbringing. A daunting task!

And again, in a way, God calls us to 'adopt' Jesus as our Guide by following His teaching and example in our daily lives.

May we help each other to respond to His call, as members together of the family of the Faithful.

SERVICES



SUNDAY 29TH SEPTEMBER 2024

Walter took this service. The first hymn was 'He Who Would Valiant Be', written by John Bunyan, who had spent twelve years in prison for his religious beliefs.

Walter's reading was John 9 verses 1-12, Jesus heals the blind man on the Sabbath. This provoked discussion with the Pharisees, who thought it was wrong. Others thought only a man of God could perform such a miracle. Jesus warned His disciples that they were being sent out like sheep among wolves and would suffer greatly.

The blind man had been expelled from the synagogue for speaking about being cured by Jesus. The man gradually came to understand who Jesus was. On being questioned by the Pharisees, he first spoke of a man called Jesus, later he describes him as 'a prophet', later he describes Him as 'from God' or the 'Son of Man'.

Some people in the temple tried to expose Jesus as a fraud but others believed in Him. Like all of us they had questions, an integral part of a journey of faith.

In his gospel and letters, John reminds us of "continuing in the word".

Becoming a Christian does not mean that life will always be easy. We must put our trust in God and pray for His strength and guidance.



SUNDAY OCTOBER 6TH 2024

There was a large gathering of School members, family and friends of Norman Sellers for a Special Service to remember Norman.

Walter Stead spoke of Norman's family life, his career as a design engineer, National Service, his 77 year marriage to Joyce, the birth of their son, Neil, and their life in the Post Office.

Judith Higgins said that Norman had been a member of SSS for ninety years. He had been a scholar, a teacher for seventy years, an Inspector. He also worked closely with Joyce, the Treasurer of the

School, helping to organise the School finances.

Both speakers spoke of Norman's strong Christian faith which governed his whole life. He was a true Christian gentleman who read his Bible every day.

Judith Curry read a poem.



Stuart Dean read from Paul's letter to the Colossian chapter 3 and Sandra Woodhouse lead the prayers and paid tribute to Norman.

At the close of the service, the congregation enjoyed the cake provided by Joyce along with tea and coffee and shared their memories of Norman.



The collection from the service was sent to the British Heart foundation.

SUNDAY OCTOBER 13TH 2024

Garth Higgins' reading was John 14 verses 7-10, in which Jesus tells the disciples if you have seen the Father.

ANNIVERSARY, SUNDAY OCTOBER 20TH 2024



There was a congregation of about thirty to celebrate the 219th Anniversary of the Sunday School and the two hundredth Anniversary of the RNLI. Walter Stead led the service and Stuart Dean read the lesson, Jesus calmed the storm on Lake Galilee. Judith Higgins told how the Sunday School raised £400 to buy a lifeboat for the RNLI

in 1866. In 1867, 20,000 people watched the naming and launch of the boat on Sykes'

Reservoir in Edgeley before the boat was sent to Dundalk in Ireland. By 1877, it had saved 37 lives.

Mr Mike Major from the RNLI talked about the history of the RNLI and showed slides and a film about the work of the RNLI today and the

different kinds of boats used by the RNLI and talked about the training of crews, lifeguards and other volunteers who work with them.



We are very grateful for Stuart Dean who recorded and played the music for the hymns and set up the IT equipment for the slides and film.

At the end of the service, everyone enjoyed cream scones, cake and a cup of tea or coffee thanks to Margaret Forster, Joyce Darvil and Judith Curry. Cath Brown produced the beautiful flower arrangement in the entrance hall. It was good to meet up with friends old and new.

LANCASHIRE HILL SUNDAY SCHOOL



Crispy chicken with harissa honey butter

Serves 2

2 breaded chicken escalopes or steaks 50g butter or 3 tbsp olive oil 2 heaped tsp harissa 1 tsp honey 2 tsp baby capers 200g green beans 2 eggs, fried to serve

Cook the chicken in the oven following pack instructions. Heat the butter or oil in a pan, then stir in the harissa, honey and capers.

Simmer the beans until just tender. Drain and toss with half the flavoured butter/oil.

Divide the beans and chicken between two plates, then top with a fried egg and drizzle over the rest of the butter/oil. Serve with potatoes of choice.

THE GOOD NEWS ABOUT YOUR FORGETFULNESS

You know the scenario – you go into the lounge, and then wonder what you wanted. Or you need to make a phone call but can't find the phone. You go to the cash point and forget your pin number. Or your car keys are lost in the kitchen, but even when you find them and go shopping, you forget stuff on the list.

If at times you find yourself living in an annoying brain-fog, the good news is that it is not because you are ill or getting old. To varying extents, everyone does it.

A recent study at the University of Edinburgh has found that forgetfulness is as common in people in their 20s as it is in people in their 50s. Although some of the people in the study were worried about getting dementia, a neuropsychiatrist at the university reassured them: "People think that if you are starting to forget things - something like misplacing your keys - that is something to worry about. But it is normal."

Good reasons for forgetting things range from the fact that too much was happening in your life at the time, you were stressed about something, not paying attention to what you were doing, or just too busy thinking about something else entirely.




