


## Stockport Sunday School






#### THANK YOU

### SUNDAY DECEMBER 1ST

Cath Brown led the service today. She started by making the advent ring then lit the first



candle, while Janet Moore read some very interesting items about the traditions of Christmas.

She told the life story of Hildegard of Bergan, medieval nun who entered into the convent when she was 8 years old by her parents. A very interesting woman who wrote a great deal of music and also medical books and

books on science. She became the Mother Superior of the monastery in later life. She is also known as a visionary of theology Three advent hymns were sung, 'O Come, O Come Emmanuel', 'The Angel glass at Ste Foy Church, Gabriel' and 'Come Though Long Expected Jesus'. An advent prayer

was written and spoken by Cath. Janet read the bible reading, Luke chapter 1 verses 46 - 51, from the Good News Bible

At the end of the service Cath had made a Scandinavian advent cake which was cut and given out to everyone.

### SUNDAY DECEMBER 8TH



Walter led the service today, the second Sunday in Advent. The second candle on the Advent wreath was lit. Advent is a

time to think of our faith and set things right with God. In the Old Testament, Habakkuk was worried about the falling standards of the people. Walter spoke of the story in John's gospel chapter 9, where Jesus heals the blind man on the sabbath. The authorities did not accept Jesus as He did not fit in with their beliefs. said, "While I am in the world, I am the light of the world." The beginning of the

gospel according to John is full of symbolism of the power of light over darkness. What John referred to as 'the word' - that was with God and was God. What has come into being in Him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. We are aware of the power of light to overcome



darkness, symbolic of the triumph of good over evil, the power of love over hate and life over death.

### CANDLE AND CAROL SERVICE, SUNDAY DECEMBER 15TH





### NEW YEAR 2025


If we put our hand in God's hand As we enter this New Year Not knowing what the future holds But that our Friend is near.

The Sinless One from heaven came To dwell with us on earth, He sought and bought us with His blood And offered us new birth.


Now as we travel through this year He knows the things He's planned, So let us trust and know just this -Our times are in His hands.

### Recipe

### Spinach and mozzarella gnocchi

Serves 4

875ml whole milk
800g shop-bought potato gnocchi
280g baby spinach leaves
80g finely grated parmesan
2 tsp finely grated lemon rind
Sea salt and cracked black pepper
2 x 125g fresh mozzarella, drained well and torn




Place the milk in a deep ovenproof frying pan and bring to a simmer. Add the gnocchi and cook for 3 minutes or until just soft.

Heat the oven grill to high.

Stir through the baby spinach, 60g of the parmesan, lemon rind, salt and pepper.

Top with mozzarella and remaining parmesan. Grill for 8-10 minutes or until golden and serve.

As New Year 2025 fast approaches, my mind goes back to the very many New Year celebrations which are tucked away in my memory. I'd like to share a few of them with you.

My earliest one is of a New Year celebration spent at a Social Evening at Heaviley Sunday School, with my friend, Mary. For

many teenage years, on New Year's Eve, all dressed up, we trotted along to Sunday School.

We watched the M.C's demonstrating the dances - waltz, quickstep, fox-trot (very difficult), Veleta, St Bernard's Waltz, Barn Dance, and our favourite - the Mississippi Dip!! We were hoping that one of the boys in the Young People's Department would ask us to dance, and if not, it was fine to dance together! The 'smash and grab' quickstep was a great



favourite with us, as was the 'Elimination Waltz', where, if you were lucky, you won a



prize at the end. It was always a great evening, but when it came to midnight and everyone rushed around kissing each other, Mary and I beat a hasty retreat, grabbed our coats and escaped!

Another New Year's Eve, which is tucked away in my memory is one at Judith Curry's house. We

played lots of games and there was a cousin there who liked playing weird tunes by running a damp finger around the edge of his wine glass!

After we were married, Derek and I had parties of our own with friends and neighbours and we always played games - usually very active ones! When our children were old enough to take part, even more games were introduced and New Year had to be let in properly with Dad going out of the back door with a slice of bread, a piece of coal, and a glass of wine. ### Gifts of the Wise Men

What about their GIFTS of GOLD, FRANKINCENSE and MYRRH? One Victorian scholar has offered a possible explanation. He was the Rev John HENRY HOPKINS, an American Episcopalian minister, who in 1857 wrote the much-loved Christmas CAROL, 'We THREE KINGS of ORIENT Are'.

Gold, said John Henry Hopkins, was a gift that would have been given to a king.

Frankincense had traditionally been brought by priests as they **WORSHIP**ped God in the **TEMPLE**. Myrrh was a **SPICE** that the **ANCIENTS** used in preparing **BODIES** for **BURIAL**.

If that is true, then you could say that the Wise Men, in choosing their gifts for this infant, HONOURED Jesus with gold because He was King of the Jews, with frankincense because He was to be worshipped as DIVINE, and with myrrh, because He would also become a SACRIFICE and DIE for His people. The Wise Men were the very first GENTILEs ever to worship Jesus. What FAITH they had!
